1. STATEMENT OF MARKET SERVED:

The ATS International Conference is a gathering of pulmonary, critical care and sleep clinicians and researchers. The Conference program presents developments in clinical practice; clinical, basic, and translation research; health advocacy; and patient and professional education. The ATS presents an interactive venue for the presentation of original research from scientific abstracts and provides clinicians and researchers the opportunity to interact and exchange ideas.

2. STATEMENT OF VERIFICATION METHODOLOGY:

No badges were mailed before the show. Pre-registered attendees picked up their badge and credentials on site via electronic will-call or by visiting a manned registration station. When arriving onsite, attendees scanned the bar code in their printed confirmation or looked up their name at the self-registration kiosk to print their badge. Attendants were on site to research registration records, verify them and then print badges. When a badge was printed, it created a time/date stamp at the time the data was captured within the electronic registration database. If a badge was re-printed, the original data and time stamp was retained.
